Sunday, 17 December 2017 Third Sunday of Advent – Year B



Dear Parishioners and Visitors,

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say rejoice. Indeed the Lord is near." (Phil.4.4-5)

Christmas this year falls on a Monday, and then perhaps some might be tempted to ask whether a person might fulfil the obligations to attend Mass on Sunday and Christmas by means of attending just one Mass, on Sunday evening.

Hopefully not many Catholics are so miserly with their time, so misplaced in their priorities, so ungenerous in their discipleship and so negligent in their Church membership responsibilities that they would seek to minimise the time they "have to" spend in worship. But just in case you know somebody who may wish to, the short answer is "no".

Two obligations = two Masses.

The obligation to attend Mass on the 4th Sunday of Advent 2017 is fulfilled by attending any Mass celebrated on Saturday evening 23rd or Sunday 24th, including a Sunday evening Mass (even if the prayers and readings are for Christmas not for the Sunday). The obligation to attend Mass for Christmas 2017 is fulfilled by attending any Mass on Sunday evening or on Monday 25th. A person cannot fulfil both obligations by attending only one Mass over the period from Saturday evening to Monday night.

The following weekend will be simpler: New Year's Day is not a Holy Day of Obligation in Australia.

Some people complain that the Church has rules and obligations. They forget that the Church is a Mother, and by wholesome discipline empowers her children to grow in faith and grace. I think that if only everyone in the Church paid more attention to the "rules" there would be much more joy and far less damage to vulnerable souls.



Second Reading 1 Thes 5:16-24


A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians

Gospel Jn 1:6-8. 19-28

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

There stands among you, unknown to you, the one who is coming after me.

A man came, sent by God. His name was John. He came as a witness, as a witness to speak for the light, so that everyone might believe through him. He was not the light, only a witness to speak for the light.

This is how John appeared as a witness. When the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' he not only declared, but he declared quite openly, 'I am not the Christ.' 'Well then,' they asked, 'are you Elijah?' 'I am not,' he said. 'Are you the Prophet?' He answered, 'No.' So they said to him, 'Who are you? We must take back an answer to those who sent us. What have you to say about yourself?' So John said, 'I am, as Isaiah prophesied: a voice that cries in the wilderness: Make a straight way for the Lord.'

Now these men had been sent by the Pharisees, and they put this further question to him, 'Why are you baptising if you are not the Christ, and not Elijah, and not the prophet?' John replied, 'I baptise with water; but there stands among you – unknown to you – the one who is coming after me; and I am not fit to undo his sandal-strap.' This happened at Bethany, on the far side of the Jordan, where John was baptising.
