Sunday, 04 Nov 2018 Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year B



Dear Parishioners and Visitors,

I am writing this from our sister-parish on Norfolk Island, in the South Pacific. As in so many villages and towns across Australia and New Zealand – indeed, across the whole world – there stands in Norfolk's little capital, Kingston, a gleaming white monument to those who served in the First World War. Seventy - seven are named from this small island paradise, of whom thirteen are marked as 'died on active service.'

It is a reminder of the vast, black tragedy of The Great War, in which so many millions were slaughtered and the world was so profoundly shaken that nothing would ever be the same again.

The loss of life was appalling, and left a gaping hole in lives of millions of spouses, parents, children, siblings – indeed of every community, including of course the Catholic community of Australia. Look around any of our parish churches built before or shortly after the Great War and you will often find stained glass windows and altar furnishings given in memory of a loved one who fell at Gallipoli, or in Palestine, or in the trenches of Flanders, or at sea, or even in the air in those fledgling days of flying machines. Few families were untouched by death, or unaffected by the physical wounds, and emotional ones too, carried by those who eventually came home.

Next Sunday is November 11th, the Centenary of the Armistice which brought the carnage to an end at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, 1918. It is important that we should mark this day in a special way.

The nation and the armed forces will have their solemn ceremonies of remembrance, in their own proper manner, next Sunday and we in Australia's mother church will remember the dead in our own proper manner, at the Altar, offering the Sacrifice of the Mass on the Lord's Day.

The music for the 10.30am Solemn Mass next Sunday has been especially chosen to mark Armistice Day. It will include elements of the Requiem of Fauré, and music by F. S. Kelly, a Sydney-born composer killed in the Battle of the Somme.

Near the end of the Solemn Mass, a wreath will be laid at the Memorial to Fallen Australian Soldiers in the Cathedral, and should you wish you might lay a wreath or flowers there before or after any of the Masses that day, and pray to God for their souls.

Let us remember the sacrifice of those who died, and let us be resolved to always look for the way to peace. Whenever there is war we are all, one way or another, its victims.

Second Reading Heb 7:23-28

A reading from the letter to The Hebrews

This one, because he remains forever, has an eternal priesthood.

There used to be a great number of priests under the former covenant, because death put an end to each one of them; but this one, Christ, because he remains forever, can never lose his priesthood. It follows, then, that his power to save is utterly certain, since he is living forever to intercede for all who come to God through him.

To suit us, the ideal high priest would have to be holy, innocent and uncontaminated, beyond the influence of sinners, and raised up above the heavens; one who would not need to offer sacrifices every day, as the other high priests do for their own sins and then for those of the people, because he has done this once and for all by offering himself. The Law appoints high priests who are men subject to weakness; but the promise on oath, which came after the Law, appointed the Son who is made perfect forever.

Gospel Mk 12:28-34

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

This is the first commandment, and the second is similar to it.

One of the scribes came up to Jesus and put a question to him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied, 'This is the first: Listen, Israel, the Lord our God is the one Lord, and you must love the Lord you God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: You must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.' The scribe said to him, 'Well spoken, Master; what you have said is true: that he is one and there is no other. To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding and strength, and to love your neighbour as yourself, this is far more important than any holocaust or sacrifice.' Jesus, seeing how wisely he had spoken, said, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' And after that no one dared to question him anymore.
