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# Sunday, 27 October 2019 Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time – Year C



Dear Parishioners and Visitors,

My thanks to those who have completed our Cathedral Parish Census forms. I would encourage everyone to do so as a help to our pastoral planning.

Today at the 10.30 Mass, Bishop Terry Brady will administer the Sacrament of Confirmation to a large group of adults from across the Archdiocese. We welcome them and their sponsors and families to the St Mary's Cathedral. These celebrations of Confirmation for adults who have not yet been Confirmed take place in the

cathedral a couple of times a year. Catholic adults who have never yet received Confirmation should contact the priest in their local parish to discuss further.

This Friday, 1st November, is All Saints' Day, and of course Saturday, 2nd November is All Souls' Day. Please remember to pray for the souls of your deceased family and friends during November, because we can assist the souls in Purgatory with our prayer. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church explains:

# The Final Purification, or Purgatory

1030 All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven.

1031 The Church gives the name Purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned.(Cf. Council of Florence (1439): DS 1304; Council of Trent (1563): DS 1820; (1547): 1580; see also Benedict XII, Benedictus Deus (1336): DS 1000.) The Church formulated her doctrine of faith on Purgatory especially at the Councils of Florence and Trent. The tradition of the Church, by reference to certain texts of Scripture, speaks of a cleansing fire: (Cf. 1 Cor 3:15; 1 Pet 1:7.)

As for certain lesser faults, we must believe that, before the Final Judgment, there is a purifying fire. He who is truth says that whoever utters blasphemy against the Holy Spirit will be pardoned neither in this age nor in the age to come. From this sentence we understand that certain offenses can be forgiven in this age, but certain others in the age to come. (St. Gregory the Great, Dial. 4, 39: PL 77, 396; cf. Mt 12:31.)

1032 This teaching is also based on the practice of prayer for the dead, already mentioned in Sacred Scripture: "Therefore Judas Maccabeus made atonement for the dead, that they might be delivered from their sin." (2 Macc 12:46.)

From the beginning the Church has honoured the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God. (Cf. Council of Lyons II (1274): DS 856.) The Church also commends almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead:

Let us help and commemorate them. If Job's sons were purified by their father's sacrifice, why would we doubt that our offerings for the dead bring them some consolation? Let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer our prayers for them. (St. John Chrysostom, Hom. in 1 Cor. 41, 5: PG 61, 361; cf. Job 1:5.)

And for those who are musically inclined, I strongly recommend listening to a good recording of Elgar's setting of St John Henry Newman's "The Dream of Gerontius." on All Souls Day as a reflection on Christian hope, death, judgement, purification and the promise of eternal life. I will be doing so myself that day while at our sister parish on Norfolk Island, a place which has one of the most beautiful and atmospheric cemeteries in the whole world.




# Second Reading 2 Tm 4:6-8, 16-18

My life is already being poured away as a libation, and the time has come for me to be gone. I have fought the good fight to the end; I have run the race to the finish; I have kept the faith; all there is to come now is the crown of righteousness reserved for me, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give to me on that Day; and not only to me but to all those who have longed for his Appearing.

But the Lord stood by me and gave me power, so that through me the whole message might be proclaimed for all the pagans to hear; and so I was rescued from the lion's mouth. 

# A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

# The publican returned to his home justified; the pharisee did not.

Jesus spoke the following parable to some people who prided themselves on being virtuous and despised everyone else, 'Two men went up to the Temple to pray, one a Pharisee, the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood there and said this prayer to himself, "I thank you, God, that I am not grasping, unjust, adulterous like the rest of mankind, and particularly that I am not like this tax collector here. I fast twice a week; I pay tithes on all I get." The tax collector stood some distance away, not daring even to raise his eyes to heaven; but he beat his breast and said, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." This man, I tell you, went home again at rights with God; the other did not. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'
