FIRST READING Isaiah 8:23 - 9:3

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

In the Galilean country, the people have seen a great light.

In days past the Lord humbled the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in days to come he will confer glory on the Way of the Sea on the far side of Jordan, province of the nations.

The people that walked in darkness has seen a great light; on those who live in a land of deep shadow a light has shone.
You have made their gladness greater,

you have made their joy increase; they rejoice in your presence as men rejoice at harvest time, as men are happy when they are dividing the spoils.

For the yoke that was weighing on him, the bar across his shoulders, the rod of his oppressor, these you break as on the day of Midian.

SECOND READING 1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

I appeal to you, my brothers and sisters, make up the differences between you.

I appeal to you, brothers, for the sake of our Lord Jesus Christ, to make up the differences between you, and instead of disagreeing among yourselves, to be united again in your belief and practice. From what Chloe's people have been telling me, my dear brothers, it is clear that there are serious differences among you. What I mean are all these slogans that you have, like: 'I am for Paul', 'I am for Apollo', 'I am for Cephas', 'I am for Christ'. Has Christ been parcelled out? Was it Paul that was crucified for you? Were you baptised in the name of Paul?

For Christ did not send me to baptise, but to preach the Good News, and not to preach that in the terms of philosophy in which the crucifixion of Christ cannot be expressed.

Hearing that John had been arrested Jesus went back to Galilee, and leaving Nazareth he went and settled in Capernaum, a lakeside town on the borders of Zebulun and Naphtali. In this way the prophecy of Isaiah was to be fulfilled:

Land of Zebulun! Land of Naphtali!
Way of the sea on the far side of Jordan,
Galilee of the nations!
The people that lived in darkness
has seen a great light;
on those who dwell in the land and shadow of death
a light has dawned.

From that moment Jesus began his preaching with the message, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand'.

WORD FROM THE DEAN



Dear Cathedral Parishioners and Visitors,

The Gospel reading of today's Mass refers to the town of Capernaum. Jesus chose to settle there after he left Nazareth. He preached in the synagogue there, he called several of the disciples who would become apostles there, and it was in Capernaum that he worked a number of miracles recorded in the Gospels.

One of the great blessings in my life was a visit to Capernaum a few years ago. I hope that many of you may have that opportunity also, for it brings a whole new perspective to prayerful reading of the scriptures, and it challenges one to a deeper faith in Jesus, our Master. In Our Lord's time Capernaum was a thriving lakeside town on the trade route between Damascus and Egypt. Capernaum was the place where Son of God's voice was heard in the streets and the synagogue, where divine power healed the sick and cast out devils and Our Lord even terrified his disciples by walking on the lake, and whose citizens had more opportunity than almost anyone else to hear and believe in Christ – and because of that, the harsher would be the judgement they would receive for their unbelief. Jesus said: "And you, Capernaum, will you be exalted to heaven? No, you will be brought down to Hades. For if the deeds of power done in you had been done in Sodom, it would have remained until this day." (Matthew 11.23)

The message Jesus preached to them at Capernaum began with "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand" and his miracles should also have spurred them to a strong new fidelity to God. Alas, it seems that on the whole, they lacked faith.

What are the divine words and signs that you and I witness in our life that we should give more heed to? How is it that we sometimes wander in the darkness, even though a great light has shone?


