THE LITURGY OF THE WORD



FIRST READING Genesis 2:7-9, 3:1-7

A reading from the book of Genesis Creation of our first parents, and sin.

The Lord God fashioned man of dust from the soil. Then he breathed into his nostrils a breath of life, and thus man became a living being.

The Lord God planted a garden in Eden which is in the east, and there he put the man he had fashioned. The Lord God caused to spring up from the soil every kind of tree, enticing to look at and good to eat, with the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil in the middle of the garden.

The serpent was the most subtle of all the wild beasts that the Lord God had made. It asked the woman, 'Did God really say you were not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?' The woman answered the serpent, 'We may eat the fruit of the trees in the garden. But of the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden God said, "You must not eat it, nor touch it, under pain of death".' Then the serpent said to the woman, 'No! You will not die! God knows in fact that on the day you eat it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods, knowing good and evil.' The woman saw that the tree was good to eat and pleasing to the eye, and that it was desirable for the knowledge that it could give. So she took some of its fruit and ate it. She gave some also to her husband who was with her, and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened and they realised that they were naked. So they sewed fig-leaves together to make themselves loin-cloths.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans Where sin increased, there grace abounded all the more.

Sin entered the world through one man, and through sin death, and thus death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned. If it is certain that death reigned over everyone as the consequence of one man's fall, it is even more certain that one man, Jesus Christ, will cause everyone to reign in life who receives the free gift that he does not deserve, of being made righteous. Again, as one man's fall brought condemnation on everyone, so the good act of one man brings everyone life and makes them justified. As by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by one man's obedience many will be made righteous.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew Jesus fasted for forty days and nights.

WORD FROM THE DEAN



Dear Cathedral Parishioners and Visitors,

Welcome to the First Sunday of Lent!

I don't suppose anyone in Sydney could be unaware of the current events in our city connected to the "World Pride" and the Sydney Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras. In addition, the politicians and media were excited this week by the issues of banning "gay conversion therapy" and of the rights of religious schools around employment of those who share the beliefs or ethos of the school around moral issues.

So, because a big portion of society, the media, and commentators don't really understand where the Catholic Church's attitude is coming from, I thought it might be opportune to briefly mention something about the basis of Catholic teaching around sexuality and gender. This is not comprehensive but I hope is at least helpful.

Vitally, there is the concept of sexual identity. That is, human beings are created male and female. This is not a social construct, it is a manifest reality, and it has <u>meaning</u>, indeed a physical, moral and spiritual meaning. It means the two sexes have both *difference* and *complementarity*, and this is oriented towards what the Church calls "the goods of marriage and the flourishing of family life." (see the *Catechism of the Catholic Church, n. 2333*)

Clearly, the way in which the complementarity, needs, and mutual support between the sexes are lived out has a profound effect on our society.

So, if we leave aside for the moment the question of how people feel about their sexual identity or attractions, there is an objective quality of meaning and purpose which is intrinsic to sexual identity, and which ought to be understood. Subjectively, of course, individuals will have their own personal experience of their sexual identity, yet ought to seek to understand it and themselves in the context of the full meaning of human sexual identity.

This is a spring from which the Church's teachings flow. There is nothing of hate or rejection or injustice in it. It has always been challenging, because people have always had to grapple with conflicting interests and feelings and experiences, and societies and cultures have had different ways of conceiving such matters in the public and private sphere. But the concept of sexual identity as rightly understood has clear implications for how we should approach all sorts of things, from sexual activity of any kind outside marriage, to homosexuality, to gender identity, and all the personal feelings and struggles that people have. And this is something to be approached not only with love but with truth.

Anyway, you don't have to do penance on the Sundays of Lent, so I'll stop there.

May God bless us all in the week ahead.






Sisterhood Catholic Womens' Conference


The Sisterhood conference is a weekend for women aged 18+ to grow in their faith and encounter a community of like minded Catholic women committed to their faith.
