

#### FIRST READING Deuteronomy 8:2-3, 14-16

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy

He gave you food which you and your ancestors did not know.

Moses said to the people: 'Remember how the Lord your God led you for forty years in the wilderness, to humble you, to test you and know your inmost heart - whether you would keep his commandments or not. He humbled you, he made you feel hunger, he fed you with manna which neither you nor your fathers had known, to make you understand that man does not live on bread alone but that man lives on everything that comes from the mouth of the Lord.

#### GOSPEL John 6:51-58

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John *My flesh is real food and my blood is real drink.* 

Jesus said to the Jews:

'I am the living bread which has come down from heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will live for ever; and the bread that I shall give is my flesh, for the life of the world.'

Then the Jews started arguing with one another: 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' they said. Jesus replied:

'I tell you most solemnly, if you do not eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood. you will not have life in you. Anyone who does eat my flesh and drink my blood has eternal life, and I shall raise him up on the last day. For my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me and I live in him. As I, who am sent by the living Father, myself draw life from the Father, so whoever eats me will draw life from me. This is the bread come down from heaven; not like the bread our ancestors ate: they are dead, but anyone who eats this bread will live for ever.'

#### WORD FROM THE DEAN



Dear Cathedral Parishioners and Visitors.

The period immediately after the Easter season and Pentecost brings several important feasts, such as the Most Holy Trinity last Sunday, The Body and Blood of Christ (*Corpus Christi*) today, and The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus this Friday.

I would like to mention that there are special opportunities to gain a **Plenary Indulgence** today (Sunday) and this Friday.

What is an Indulgence?

An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven.

We speak of "eternal punishment" and "temporal punishment" for sin.

"Eternal punishment" is the consequence of mortal or death-bearing sin. Eternal punishment is to lose the gift of divine grace within us. Unless that gift of grace is restored to us before we die we cannot enter into heavenly life and see God face-to-face: we would be cut off from God forever in hell: that is eternal punishment for sin. Jesus Christ, by his saving death on the Cross and his resurrection has made it possible for the eternal punishment due to sin to be taken away by his grace.

"Temporal punishment" for sins is different: both grave sins and venial sins also incur temporal punishment, which is what must happen for the effects of our sins to be dealt with and for the fulfilment of justice. Now, it may be when we confess and are forgiven that our contrition is so perfect and our penitence so sincere that the temporal punishment due to us is expiated. But what is not repaired by us in that way must be atoned for by further penance either in this life or, after our death, in the state of purification we know as Purgatory.

#### How does an Indulgence "work"?

An Indulgence adds to the intrinsic merit of a penance, prayer or good work that we do: it adds something of the infinite merits of Christ and the merits of the saints in heaven with whom we are in fellowship, so that the temporal punishment due to our sin is made up for, not only by our prayers and penance, but by the abundant goodness of Christ and his saints. An Indulgence is, in the end, a gift from Christ

received in and through his Body the Church: not because we "deserve" it, but because God loves us and makes it possible through his Church.

The effect of an Indulgence may be the remission of <u>all</u> the temporal punishment due to sin – a "Plenary Indulgence" – or <u>part</u> of the temporal punishment – a "Partial Indulgence". Because an Indulgence is a loving gift received in and through Christ's Church, it requires one to confess ones sins and receive absolution in the Sacrament of Penance, to be in Communion with Christ through the sacrament of the Eucharist, to express one's communion with the universal Church by praying for the Pope, as well as by undertaking with faith and love whatever specific prayer, penance or worthy activity the particular Indulgence relates to.

<u>Today, June 11<sup>th</sup>, Corpus Christi</u>, a Plenary Indulgence may be gained by publicly reciting the *Tantum ergo* during the liturgical rites. This will be possible:

- At the end of the "Walk with Christ" Eucharistic Procession this afternoon. The procession begins at 2.30pm sharp from the corner of Martin Place and Pitt Street, and concludes on the cathedral forecourt.
- At Vespers and Benediction in the cathedral this evening, beginning at 5.00pm.

This Friday 16<sup>th</sup> June, Sacred Heart, a Plenary Indulgence may be gained by publicly reciting the Act of Reparation to the Sacred Heart. There will be an opportunity to do this at each Mass in the cathedral on that day, and also at the Holy Hour (Rosary and Benediction) commencing at 12 noon; and also at our sister parish of Darlinghurst at the end of the 9am Mass in Sacred Heart Church – which will also be followed by Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament until 11am.

Only one Plenary Indulgence can be gained on any one day, and the additional conditions for gaining an indulgence are

- (1) Be free of all attachment to sin, even venial sin;
- (2) Perform the indulgenced work; and
- (3) Receive sacramental Confession, Holy Communion, and pray for the Pope's intentions (e.g., by reciting an Our Father and a Hail Mary) within several days (about 20) before or after carrying out the indulgenced work. Only one plenary indulgence may be gained per day. One sacramental Confession will suffice for several plenary indulgences; however, a separate Communion and separate prayers for the Holy Father's intentions are required for each Plenary Indulgence.

I hope you will be moved to fulfil the conditions to receive such a gift in these days.


