FIRST READING Proverbs 31:10-13, 19-20, 30-31

A reading from the book of Proverbs Give her a share in what she has worked for.

A perfect wife - who can find her? She is far beyond the price of pearls. Her husband's heart has confidence in her, from her he will derive no little profit. Advantage and not hurt she brings him all the days of her life. She is always busy with wool and with flax, she does her work with eager hands. She sets her hands to the distaff, her fingers grasp the spindle. She holds out her hand to the poor, she opens her arms to the needy. SECOND READING 1 Thessalonians 5:1-6

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians The day of the Lord is going to come like a thief in the night.

You will not be expecting us to write anything to you, brothers, about 'times and seasons,' since you know very well that the Day of the Lord is going to come like a thief in the night. It is when people are saying, 'How quiet and peaceful it is,' that the worst suddenly happens, as suddenly as labour pains come on a pregnant woman; and there will be no way for anybody to evade it.

But it is not as if you live in the dark, my brothers, for that Day to overtake you like a thief. No, you are all sons of light and sons of the day: we do not belong to the night or to darkness, so we should not go on sleeping, as everyone else does, but stay wide awake and sober.

WORD FROM THE DEAN



Dear Cathedral Parishioners and Visitors,

As the tragic events continue in the Holy Land and the wider Middle East, let us continue, and intensify, our prayers for peace and justice. There have been some very ugly, disturbing, incidents of intimidation of religious and ethnic communities in our city in recent weeks. As Christian people we must keep guard against any tendency to vilification of any group, such as anti-Semitism, that we encounter. We need to do what we can to make things better, not worse, in the world, and so make our own the words of Cardinal Pizzaballa, the Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem, "in this society scarred by hatred, we may again sow the seeds of trust, of hope and of love."

With sadness we learned on Thursday of the death of Monsignor William Mullins, at the age of 99 years. Monsignor Mullins was a great friend to many of us here at St Mary's Cathedral. He lived here for a number of years, and in his "retirement" he came to celebrate the Sunday 9am Mass regularly, right up until a couple of years ago. We will publish details of Msgr Mullins' funeral when they come to hand – I'm sure many cathedral parishioners will want to attend.

We have visiting priests to celebrate several of the Masses this weekend – I am very grateful to Fr Brian Lucas and Fr Martin Maunsell for their help. Fr Brendan Purcell is still unwell in hospital though in good spirits, Fr Emmanuel Lubega has taken up his new assignment at Our Lady of Fatima Kingsgrove, and this weekend I am at our parish on Norfolk Island for a short pastoral visit. Fr Lewi Barakat and Fr George Sigamoney are "holding the fort" but even they cannot be in three churches at the same time...

ST MARY'S CATHEDRAL MASTERPLAN NEWSLETTER

November 2023



We are preparing for the future of St Mary's Cathedral, the spiritual home to Catholic communities across Greater Sydney and NSW.

St Mary's Cathedral's commitment is to protect and enhance the iconic Cathedral and grounds, whilst making it more accessible for everyone.

We have now prepared a masterplan that supports our vision to retain our status as the spiritual heart of Sydney's Catholic community.

OUR COMMUNITY AND PARISHIONERS

Our masterplan addresses what we heard from parishioners and responds to our current and future community needs.

Last month, we shared insights into the feedback we received when we spoke to hundreds of parishioners, visitors, clergy and staff about our vision for the Cathedral in July this year.

During those conversations, we heard strong support for our vision. The feedback has informed the following masterplan principles:



The **heritage of the Cathedral** is its most important feature.



The **co-location of Catholic services** on the Cathedral Precinct would support community building.



The need for **more accessible entrances** should be prioritised.



Improving the use of, and access to, **the Crypt and Chapter Hall** would enable better use of the space available for events and activities.



More **spaces to gather and sit indoors and outdoors** is critical to supporting a sense of parish community.



All people should have equal access to the bathrooms, which are currently not pram or wheelchair accessible.



The masterplan should consider **better amenities** and provide a place to get refreshments within the Precinct.



A **better located gift shop** would be less invasive than the current location.

OUR NEW PARISH AND CHANCERY BUILDING


From early feedback, we know it's important to our parishioners that we create more space for socialising and put more emphasis on creating a strong Catholic community.

To do this, we are proposing a new parish and chancery building within the Cathedral Precinct. The new building would be designed in sandstone to respectfully integrate with the Cathedral and Chapter Hall.

New parish meetings rooms and chancery office space	The parish and chancery building would include new community meeting rooms, public bathrooms, end of trip facilities and kitchen facilities. It would provide a welcoming hub that is easily accessed from the Cathedral and St Mary's Road.			
Larger, accessible bathrooms	New bathrooms, with baby change facilities, would be delivered on the Cathedral level.			
A terrace with a café, gardens and outdoor seating	The new café would face our new Sacristy Terrace at the Cathedral level. It would provide space for parishioners to socialise before and after mass.			
Improved gift shop and bookshop	The gift shop would be relocated to the new Sacristy Terrace. It would be larger and integrated with the Mustard Seed Bookshop, providing a greater selection of gifts and Catholic resourses. The new location means tourists can visit without interrupting Mass.			
Improved step-free access into the Cathedral	New accessible entrances would be delivered, offering step-free access into the Cathedral via the western and eastern entrances and at Crypt level.			
A new lift to the Crypt level	The new lift - located discretely behind the exciting stairs - on the Cathedral level would provide access to the Crypt for people with walking difficulties, prams and wheelchairs.			
New clergy bathrooms (in Sacristy)	The current bathrooms would close to the public and become clergy bathrooms within the Sacristy as there are currently none.			


MASTERPLAN (CATHEDRAL LEVEL)

PROPOSED UPGRADES TO THE CATHEDRAL

Our masterplan has been developed to retain the cultural and heritage value of the Cathedral while providing much-needed facilities for parishioners and visitors.

All proposed changes to the Cathedral are to enable improved access and enhance the way it is currently being used.

New accessible bathrooms and baby change facilities on the Crypt level	New male, female and accessible bathrooms - with baby change facilities - would be built into existing storage area adjacent to the Crypt. These would help service Masses, weddings and baptisms in the Cathedral and the Crypt.			
A new lift to the Cathedral level and step-free access into the Crypt	The new lift would provide easy access into the Cathedral from the Crypt level.			
New community meeting rooms	The parish and chancery building would provide new community meeting rooms, and be available for use by parishioners 24/7.			
Improved use of and access to Chapter Hall	Chapter Hall would be made available for more community events as there would be new bathrooms and kitchen facilities nearby.			
Chancery and Catholic support agencies	The parish and chancery building would house the Cathedral's chancery functions and Archdiocesan agencies including the Sydney Centre for Evangelisation and Justice and Peace Office.

OUR NEXT STEPS

Feedback will be considered before a Development Application (DA) is lodged with the City of Sydney Council (Council) in December 2023.

🕩 WE ARE HERE

We are engaging with the community on our masterplan.

O DECEMBER 2023:

Following engagement with the community and Council, we will lodge a DA.

• EARLY 2024:

Council will assess the DA and plans will be displayed on public exhibition. At this time, the community can make formal submissions via the City of Sydney Council.

• MID 2024:

Council will make a determination on the DA. At this time, we will update the community about the determination and next steps.

• LATE 2024:

If approved, a construction management plan will be prepared. At this time, the community will be consulted in detail about the construction process and timelines.

Ò 2025:

If the DA is approved, construction is anticipated to start in 2025. The construction process will not impact the operations of the Cathedral, and mass services will continue as per the regular schedule.

Caritas Australia's Gaza Crisis Appeal

The sudden escalation of hostilities in Israel and Gaza since 7 October has seen unimaginable impacts for the people affected by this conflict.

The human toll has been devastating with more than 7,000 deaths across Israel and Gaza. Over 5,700 Palestinians have them are children, while more than 15,000 people have been injured in Gaza.



Over 1.4 million people (60% of the population) have been displaced in Gaza with immediate food, shelter, health, and psychosocial needs.

Caritas Australia is working with our partner Catholic Relief Services (CRS), providing emergency shelter for over 1,200 people and cash support to over 7,100 families so far.
