

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD



FIRST READING Jonah 3:1-5, 10

A reading from the prophet Jonah

The Ninevites renounced their evil ways.

The word of the Lord was addressed to Jonah: 'Up!' he said 'Go to Nineveh, the great city, and preach to them as I told you to.' Jonah set out and went to Nineveh in obedience to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was a city great beyond compare: it took three days to cross it. Jonah went on into the city, making a day's journey. He preached in these words, 'Only forty days more and Nineveh is going to be destroyed.' And the people of Nineveh believed in God; they proclaimed a fast and put on sackcloth from the greatest to the least.

God saw their efforts to renounce their evil behaviour. And God relented: he did not inflict on them the disaster which he had threatened.

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians The world as we know it is passing away.

Those who have wives should live as though they had none, and those who mourn should live as though they had nothing to mourn for; those who are enjoying life should live as though there were nothing to laugh about; those whose life is buying things should live as though they had nothing of their own; and those who have to deal with the world should not become engrossed in it. WORD FROM THE ACTING DEAN



Dear Cathedral Parishioners and Visitors,

This week we will celebrate the Conversion of St Paul, a real reason to persevere in Hope, whenever we are mistreated by others for our faith in Jesus Christ.

According to Open Doors, an international NGO that keeps details of Christian persecution throughout the world, it's reported that more than 365 million Christians suffer high levels of persecution and discrimination for their faith.

To break it down further:

- 1 in 7 Christians are persecuted worldwide.
- 4,998 were murdered for their faith last year.
- 14,766 Churches and Christian properties were attacked.
- 4,125 Christians were detained.

These are our brothers and sisters in Christ who continue to share in the suffering of Christ with very little care at times from their governments or others.

United with them as one body, we do well to remember and pray for them and for each other in the face of our own sometimes silent sufferings. Actions or attitudes of hostility towards the teaching of Jesus Christ exist everywhere, and they can even creep into our families, workplaces and institutions, which can leave us discouraged or downhearted.

Saul was on the way to Damascus, the ancient land of Syria, where my parents migrated to Australia from. Saul was still breathing threats to slaughter the Lord's disciples when on the way to Damascus he had his humbling encounter with Jesus.

He fell to the ground, and then he heard a voice saying, 'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?' 'Who are you, Lord?' he asked, and the voice answered, 'I am Jesus and you are persecuting me. (See Acts 9:1-22)

By these words of Jesus we learn more about the mystical body of Christ and how intimately united we are with Christ and Christ is with us – His Church. If we share in the suffering of Christ, we too will share in His glory.

We should always keep the Road to Damascus in mind when considering our own impulsive bias or that of those who persecute us. After he was baptised and spent a few days with the disciples in Damascus, St Paul (Saul) began preaching in the synagogues, 'Jesus is the Son of God.' The great persecutor became the greatest preacher of the Christian faith.

Prayers for a Happy Australia Day for all who call this great country of ours home and for anyone who is visiting us this week.


