

FIRST READING Isaiah 66:18-21

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

They will gather all of your people from all nations.

The Lord says this: I am coming to gather the nations of every language. They shall come to witness my glory. I will give them a sign and send some of their survivors to the nations: to Tarshish, Put, Lud, Moshech, Rosh, Tubal, and Javan, to the distant islands that have never heard of me or seen my glory. They will proclaim my glory to the nations. As an offering to the Lord they will bring all your brothers, on horses, in chariots, in litters, on mules, on dromedaries, from all the nations to my holy mountain in Jerusalem, says the Lord, like Israelites bringing oblations in clean vessels to the Temple of the Lord. And of some of them I will make priests and Levites, says the Lord.

SECOND READING Hebrews 12:5-7, 11-13

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews The Lord disciplines those he loves.

Have you forgotten that encouraging text in which you are addressed as sons? My son, when the Lord corrects you, do not treat it lightly; but do not get discouraged when he reprimands you. For the Lord trains the ones that he loves and he punishes all those that he acknowledges as his sons. Suffering is part of your training; God is treating you as his sons. Has there ever been any son whose father did not train him? Of course, any punishment is most painful at the time, and far from pleasant; but later, in those on whom it has been used, it bears fruit in peace and goodness. So hold up your limp arms and steady your trembling knees and smooth out the path you tread; then the injured limb will not be wrenched, it will grow strong again.

GOSPEL *Luke* 13:22-30

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke From East and West they will come to take their place in the kingdom of God.

Through towns and villages Jesus went teaching, making his way to Jerusalem. Someone said to him, 'Sir, will there be only a few saved?' He said to them, 'Try your best to enter by the narrow door, because, I tell you, many will try to enter and will not succeed.

'Once the master of the house has got up and locked the door, you may find yourself knocking on the door, saying, "Lord, open to us" but he will answer, "I do not know where you come from." Then you will find yourself saying, "We once ate and drank in your company; you taught in our streets" but he will reply, "I do not know where you come from. Away from me, all you wicked men!"

'Then there will be weeping and grinding of teeth, when you see Abraham and Isaac and Jacob and all the prophets in the kingdom of God, and yourselves turned outside. And men from the east and west, from north and south, will come to take their places at the feast in the kingdom of God.

WORD FROM THE DEAN



Dear Cathedral Parishioners and Visitors,

Not only is Wednesday this week the Memorial of St Monica, a truly remarkable woman, but Thursday is the Memorial of her son, St Augustine, one of the most important saints in the history of the Church. Augustine's philosophy and theology have had a profound influence in Christian thought -he is one of the Doctors of the Church – and his books, such as the *Confessions*, continue to help many in our spiritual journey. St Augustine has come into people's general awareness again recently because our Pope Leo XIV is an Augustinian Friar, one of several groups of religious and clergy who follow, in various ways, the Rule of St Augustine. Pope Leo has been sprinkling his talks and homilies with quotes from the teachings of St Augustine, but in fact all the Popes tend to quote from Augustine in their writings because his thought is so very noteworthy. You can be sure we'll be hearing plenty more about St Augustine!

On Friday, The Beheading of St John the Baptist is commemorated, his last great act of witness to Christ, the Word-made-flesh. John's preaching about marriage was a reproof to Herod and Herodias: let it be a reminder to each of us, also, to order our lives in fidelity to the commandments of God, and to prefer nothing whatsoever more than the Lord's will.

Finally, a reminder that the Sydney Marathon is on next Sunday 31st. Please allow a little extra time to get to the cathedral for Mass that day as the surrounding streets will be closed. I know of at least two Catholic priests who will be running in the marathon, and I dare say many other Catholic athletes will take part. There will be a Blessing of Runners at the 6pm Mass on Saturday 30th, celebrated by Bishop Danny Meagher. So, as the Letter to the Hebrews reminds us in the Second Reading today, "hold up your limp arms and steady your trembling knees and smooth out the path you tread."

















ELECTRONIC COLLECTION PLATES
