

## THE LITURGY OF THE WORD



### FIRST READING Amos 8:4-7

A reading from the prophet Amos

The Lord God spoke against those who buy the poor for money.

Listen to this, you who trample on the needy and try to suppress the poor people of the country, you who say, 'When will New Moon be over so that we can sell our corn, and sabbath, so that we can market our wheat? Then by lowering the bushel, raising the shekel, by swindling and tampering with the scales, we can buy up the poor for money, and the needy for a pair of sandals, and get a price even for the sweepings of the wheat.' The Lord swears it by the pride of Jacob, 'Never will I forget a single thing you have done.'

### RESPONSORIAL PSALM Ps 112:1-2, 4-8

**R.** Praise the Lord who lifts up the poor.

Praise, O servants of the Lord, praise the name of the Lord!
May the name of the Lord be blessed both now and for evermore! *R*.

High above all nations is the Lord, above the heavens his glory.
Who is like the Lord, our God, who has risen on high to his throne yet stoops from the heights to look down, to look down upon heaven and earth? *R*.

From the dust he lifts up the lowly, from the dungheap he raises the poor to set him in the company of princes, yes, with the princes of his people. *R*.

### SECOND READING 1 Timothy 2:1-8

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to Timothy

Let prayers be offered to God for everyone; he wants all people to be saved.

My advice is that, first of all, there should be prayers offered for everyone - petitions, intercessions and thanksgiving - and especially for kings and others in authority, so that we may be able to live religious and reverent lives in peace and quiet. To do this is right, and will please God our saviour: he wants everyone to be saved and reach full knowledge of the truth. For there is only one God, and there is only one mediator between God and mankind, himself a man, Christ Jesus, who sacrificed himself as a ransom for them all. He is the evidence of this, sent at the appointed time, and I have been named a herald and apostle of it and - I am telling the truth and no lie - a teacher of the faith and the truth to the pagans.

In every place, then, I want the men to lift their hands up reverently in prayer, with no anger or argument.

If then you cannot be trusted with money, that tainted thing, who will trust you with genuine riches? And if you cannot be trusted with what is not yours, who will give you what is your very own?

'No servant can be the slave of two masters: he will either hate the first and love the second, or treat the first with respect and the second with scorn. You cannot be the slave both of God and of money.'

### WORD FROM THE DEAN



Dear Cathedral Parishioners and Visitors.

I am excited that our Cathedral Choir will be going on tour mid next year to Rome, Edinburgh and London! This should be a wonderful experience for the choristers and is a great opportunity to showcase the importance we place on sacred music in the life of St Mary's Cathedral, Sydney – as we prepare for the International Eucharistic Congress here in 2028. It is a big undertaking, though, and we will be begging your help through various fundraising opportunities to help the Choir on their way. Do keep an eye out for some special notices about this!

We Australians are blessed to be able to live in peace and to plan such travels to relatively calm and safe places. That is not so for many in our world, and the appalling situation in the Holy Land is deeply disturbing. Moreover, there are ugly things even in our own society: immorality, violence, assisted suicide, the killing of the unborn, the exploitation of the vulnerable, and the spreading of false and corrosive ideas. As Catholics, we should respond to these times with faith and reason, not with ideology and prejudice. We should always remember the dignity of each person, and try to elevate our community, not break it down. Less time interacting with the shallowness and pseudo philosophy of social media, more time doing nice things for others: that would help make the world, and your own headspace, brighter and more fulfilled. Here is a good prayer from the Missal, "For the Progress of Peoples:"

O God, who gave one origin to all peoples and willed to gather from them one family for yourself, fill all hearts, we pray, with the fire of your love and kindle in them a desire for the just advancement of their neighbour, that, through the good things which you richly bestow upon all, each human person may be brought to perfection, every division may be removed, and equity and justice may be established in human society. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.




### A message from the Archdiocese of Sydney:


Child sexual abuse is a crime. The appropriate people to deal with crimes are the police. If you, or anyone you know, have been abused, please contact the police.
