

FIRST READING Amos 6:1, 4-7

A reading from the prophet Amos You who give yourself to licentiousness and revelry will be exiled.

The almighty Lord says this:

Woe to those ensconced so snugly in Zion and to those who feel so safe on the mountain of Samaria. GOSPEL Luke 16:19-31

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

During your life good things came your way just as bad things came the way of

Lazarus. Now he is being comforted while you are in agony.

Jesus said to the Pharisees: 'There was a rich man who used to dress in purple and fine linen and feast magnificently every day. And at his gate there lay a poor man called Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to fill himself with the scraps that fell from the rich man's table. Dogs even came and licked his sores. Now the poor man died and was carried away by the angels to the bosom of Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried.

'In his torment in Hades he looked up and saw Abraham a long way off with Lazarus in his bosom. So he cried out, "Father Abraham, pity me and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am in agony in these flames." "My son," Abraham replied "remember that during your life good things came your way, just as bad things came the way of Lazarus. Now he is being comforted here while you are in agony. But that is not all: between us and you a great gulf has been fixed, to stop anyone, if he wanted to, crossing from our side to yours, and to stop any crossing from your side to ours."

'The rich man replied, "Father, I beg you then to send Lazarus to my father's house, since I have five brothers, to give them warning so that they do not come to this place of torment too." "They have Moses and the prophets," said Abraham, "let them listen to them." "Ah, no, father Abraham," said the rich man "but if someone comes to them from the dead, they will repent." Then Abraham said to him, "If they will not listen either to Moses or to the prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone should rise from the dead.""

WORD FROM THE DEAN



Dear Cathedral Parishioners and Visitors,

Monday 29 September will be the Feast of the Archangels, Saints Michael, Gabriel and Raphael. Thursday 2nd October is the Memorial of the Holy Guardian Angels.

The existence of angels is a truth of faith. Both Sacred Scripture and the Tradition attest to the existence of spiritual, non-corporeal beings that Scripture usually calls "angels." Their nature is spirit, their office is "angel", which means "messenger" – they are the servants and messengers of God. They have intelligence, they have will, they are immortal, they are splendid.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us:

333 From the Incarnation to the Ascension, the life of the Word incarnate is surrounded by the adoration and service of angels. When God "brings the firstborn into the world, he says: 'Let all God's angels worship him.'" Heb 1:6. Their song of praise at the birth of Christ has not ceased resounding in the Church's praise: "Glory to God in the highest!" Lk 2:14. They protect Jesus in his infancy, serve him in the desert, strengthen him in his agony in the garden, when he could have been saved by them from the hands of his enemies as Israel had been. Cf. Mt 1:20; 2:13,19; 4:11; 26:53; Mk 1:13; Lk 22:43; Macc 10:29-30; 11:8. Again, it is the angels who "evangelize" by proclaiming the Good News of Christ's Incarnation and Resurrection. Cf. Lk 2:8-14; Mk 16:5-7. They will be present at Christ's return, which they will announce, to serve at his judgement. Cf. Acts 1:10-11; Mt 13:41; 24:31; Lk 12:8-9

334 In the meantime, the whole life of the Church benefits from the mysterious and powerful help of angels. Cf. Acts 5:18-20; 8:26-29; 10:3-8; 12:6-11; 27:23-25.

335 In her liturgy, the Church joins with the angels to adore the thrice-holy God. She invokes their assistance (in the Roman Canon's *Supplices te rogamus*. . ["Almighty God, we pray that your angel..."]; in the funeral liturgy's *In Paradisum deducant te angeli*. . .["May the angels lead you into Paradise. . ."]). Moreover, in the "Cherubic Hymn" of the Byzantine Liturgy, she celebrates the memory of

certain angels more particularly (St. Michael, St. Gabriel, St. Raphael, and the guardian angels).

336 From infancy to death human life is surrounded by their watchful care and intercession. Cf. Mt 18:10; Lk 16:22; Pss 34:7; 91:10-13; Job 33:23-24; Zech 1:12; Tob 12:12. "Beside each believer stands an angel as protector and shepherd leading him to life." St. Basil, Adv. Eunomium III, I: PG 29, 656B. Already here on earth the Christian life shares by faith in the blessed company of angels and men united in God.

Our hope, as Christians, is that we will join the angels in heaven, but even now, in the liturgy, in the company of the angels we sing God's praises and we adore Christ the Lord.


