If it is certain that death reigned over everyone as the consequence of one man's fall, it is even more certain that one man, Jesus Christ, will cause everyone to reign in life who receives the free gift that he does not deserve, of being made righteous. Again, as one man's fall brought condemnation on everyone, so the good act of one man brings everyone life and makes them justified. As by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by one man's obedience many will be made righteous. Dear Parishioners,

Throughout November, Catholics pray especially for the souls of those who have died, and it is customary to ask for Masses to be offered for the souls of our deceased relatives and friends. "November Mass" envelopes are available in the cathedral. You can write the names of those for whom you wish Mass to be celebrated on the envelope. The NSW Bishops have set the offering ("stipend") to be made to the priest for November Masses at twenty dollars for each Mass. The stipend is considered a gift to the priest who celebrates the Mass and a way for the donors to join themselves more closely to the holy sacrifice by making an offering from their own resources.


